To date, \$6,550.43 has been distributed in scholarships.

The amount available each year will be based on 5% of the balance in the Endowment Fund, which is \$16,078.95 as of Dec. 31, 2014. Rev. Bartel's hope was that others would also contribute to this Endowment Fund. To date others who share his passion have added just over \$4,000.

Heart-Warming Tree

One church decided to have a heart-warming tree after seeing one in another church decorated with fabric patches to represent blankets. They took a small bare tree, painted it white, trimmed it with miniature white lights, and placed it in the front of the sanctuary. For Blanket Sunday in February, they placed red cardboard hearts on the tree and announced the theme: "A Heart - Warming Event." For a donation, members of the congregation could have their own or a loved one's name printed on a heart. The money was used to purchase blankets to be distributed by the denomination's missionary ministries.

Because nearly twice as much money was collected that year as in previous years, it was decided to keep the tree and use it for other church fund-raising projects.

In March, shamrocks were placed on the tree and the money raised was used to carpet one of the Sunday school rooms.

This is a great idea! In April, crosses can be used; in May, graduation caps; in June, praying children; in July, flags; in August, butterflies; in September, children's backpacks; and in October, pumpkins. In November, turkeys might be placed on the tree and the money raised could be used to aid a local food pantry. In December symbols of the nativity could be used to raise money for the victims of a hurricane, flood, or other disaster.

#15-3 Giving is Putting God First. "The truth is that this poor widow gave more to the collection than all the others put together. All the others gave what they'll never miss; she gave extravagantly what she couldn't afford – she gave her all." (Mark 12:43-44, The Message)

Jane grew up attending church almost every Sunday and receiving some coins from her parents each week to add to the offering. In her first leadership position in the church as a young adult, Pastor Dick asked her to lead the "gifts" portion of the confirmation lesson. The class was studying our United Methodist vows to support the church through our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness. She responded, "I'm not sure you want me to lead that one. I want to give, but I'm saving for graduate school. I just give what I can." Pastor Dick quickly asked her to cover a different aspect of the lesson that day!

That was a pivotal moment in her decision to begin putting God first in all aspects of her life. In that moment she realized her thinking had been, "Who me? Why should I give something of my own back to God?" From that moment on she felt called to begin giving something back to God on a regular basis from her own income. Her goal was to give at least enough to pay her fair share of the apportionments her church paid every year and whatever else she could.

Eventually, Jane grew in her faith and increased her giving to 5 percent of every paycheck as often as she could. Years later some crises in her life helped her to see the miracles of God's mighty love more clearly and her offerings shifted from dues she thought she owed to gifts of thanks. Ultimately, she gave to express her hope and belief in the miracles of God's love and took the risk of asking what God was calling her to give. Now, she is "Putting God First" and having her full tithe (10%) deposited to the church electronically on the first day of every pay period. What is God calling you to give?

#15-4 Give Willingly...."Give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar—and to God what belongs to God." (Matt. 22:21)

Did you know? The average tax refund is up 3% to \$3,034 so far this year, the Internal Revenue Service reported on March 5th. The average tax refund for the last three years, paid in 2012, 2013 and 2014 was just over \$2,700.

How will we spend our tax refunds? We know that some taxpayers do not receive a refund. But, of those who do, how do they spend it? The most popular answers are: 1) Pay off Debt; 2) Have fun – do something special or buy something special and 3) Save it. On most lists of ideas the thought of 4) Giving it Away to a favorite charity is either last on the list or never makes the list!

If we're going to "give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God," what are we called to give away? As people of faith we may wish to consider giving a tithe (10%) or some portion of our tax return to the church to say thank you to God for the jobs we have and the earnings we receive.

Consider tithing. If the average refund is \$2,700 and 10 people tithe at \$270 each, the total giving to your church would increase \$2,700. That might pay most of the snow plowing bill for the winter or help you do something new and creative for Vacation Bible School.

Your tithe might be more or less than average, but a gift of \$270 would save 27 lives at \$10 apiece for the Imagine No Malaria Campaign. Gifts totaling \$2,700 would also make a big difference in paying the mission giving through our apportionments for a number of churches – for some it would pay their apportionments in full, for others it will cover 1/10 of the total or one month.

- 5. Ever thought about tithing? Start by giving the first 10% of this year's tax refund.
- 6. The rewards of tithing can start with 10% of this year's tax refund.
- 7. "Who, me? Tithe?" Why not try it by giving 10% of your 2014 tax refund.
- 8. Tithing is rewarding. Reward yourself. Start with 10% of your 2014 tax refund.
- 9. Giving 10% of your 2014 tax refund is a great way to start your life as a tither.

#15-6 *Giving is a Form of Praise* "...Praise God's glorious name; bring an offering and come into his Temple." Psalm 96:8

It's summer time and the ice cream carts are starting to make their rounds. In some places the vendors are on motorized carts, others use push carts and some ride bikes. All of them are eventually surrounded by excited patrons of all ages looking for a cool treat.

Is ice cream a need or a want? That is the question late at night when I want something cool and sweet, but it's the last thing I need! Ice cream isn't the only temptation we face as summer begins to emerge. Vacations, graduations, family reunions, picnics with family and friends all call for extra travel and special food items. With these pressures and temptations we may be wondering how we can be faithful stewards, especially in these tough economic times. Each of us has to answer this question in our own way. What is God calling us to give?

Praising God is something we all NEED to do as Christians to feed our souls. We need to continue praising God through our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service and our witness even as the temptations of summer abound. As you consider your gifts, choose an amount to dedicate in praise to God that allows you to feel at peace. Choose a regular amount of 1%, 3%, 5%, 8%, or 10% and offer that gift first, before you buy extra treats this summer.

If you're preparing for a vacation this summer, even if you're staying a lot closer to home than usual, consider this:

It's a lot easier to send your offering to the church *before* you go on vacation than to come up with two Sundays' worth when you get back. If you give it to God first to say "thank you" for the opportunity to go on vacation, you'll have a sense of the peace that comes from following the Great Commandment Jesus gave that we should love God FIRST – with all our hearts and souls and minds and strength – and our neighbors as ourselves.

An Attitude of Gratitude

Being grateful is a way to control toxic stress. Try something for the next month: Either journal or share verbally with another person what you are grateful for each day and end your day with a prayer of gratitude. When we end our day with a focus on our gratitude, we tend to sleep better, with more REM cycles (Rapid Eye Movement) and less unwanted wake ups. A good night's sleep is essential to good health, and good health is important for a good life.

It is said that even on a bad day there is something good. However, we need to get rid of the ANTS (automatic negative thoughts) to see the good. Finding a way to share our gratitude helps us remove the ANTS from our brain, giving us greater power over our fears, anxieties, bitterness and insomnia. It helps us build enthusiasm and more joyful, positive relationships. Intentionally focusing on our gratitude helps us to see the hidden gift even in the hard times. The Serenity Prayer can also help on sleepless nights:

God grant me the serenity

to accept the things I cannot change; courage to change the things I can; and wisdom to know the difference.

Thank you for your faithfulness in giving and worship attendance this summer. Your continued giving through your tithes and offerings has made it possible for us to pay our utilities and salaries and provide for persons in need. It means we have provided nursery care for our youngest disciples, summer Sunday School and Vacation Bible School classes and a youth mission trip experience. Families celebrating baptisms have been welcomed and families remembering the gifts of one who has died have been comforted.

Your giving also allows us to pay a portion of our mission giving. Our apportionments (or a-portion-meant-for-others) have put the systems in place so we could actually get pastors moved to serve new congregations throughout Wisconsin starting July 1st. They also put the systems in place to allow all of the health kits, flood buckets and other items brought to annual conference to be delivered to those in need. A total of 12,581 pounds was sent to the Midwest Mission Distribution Center following annual conference. About 1500 pounds was collected for Harbor House in Superior, about 300 pounds each for Northcott Neighborhood House and United Methodist Children's Services in Milwaukee.

Our apportionments help provide the staff and facilities at Pine Lake Camp and Lake Lucerne Camp and Retreat Center. More than 725 campers have registered to date this summer, including: Super Hero Camp, Night Owl Camp, horse camps, canoe camps, family camps, grandparent/grandchild camps, adult Special Needs camps, the Stewardship Retreat and many more. All of our camps invite children, youth and adults to experience the love of Jesus Christ in new and different ways in the outdoors.

Our ministry is in our local community, our state, our nation and world-wide. Thank you for the gifts you continue to give to the ministry of Christ through our Church in the world.

- 8. Because giving helps me keep my priorities in order. God is our higher power. Money is a thing, but it's not a god.
- Because I said I would when I joined the church, when I gave my
 word that I would support my local congregation with my prayers,
 presence, gifts and service.
- 10. I give money because I have witnessed with my own eyes the transforming, resurrecting power of God's love. It affects people's lives and hearts, in part through the ministries that this church performs and provides. In the real world, ministries need supplies, leaders, staff, equipment, curriculum, paper, bread, scissors, and sheet music worldly stuff for an out-of-this-world revelation of love!
